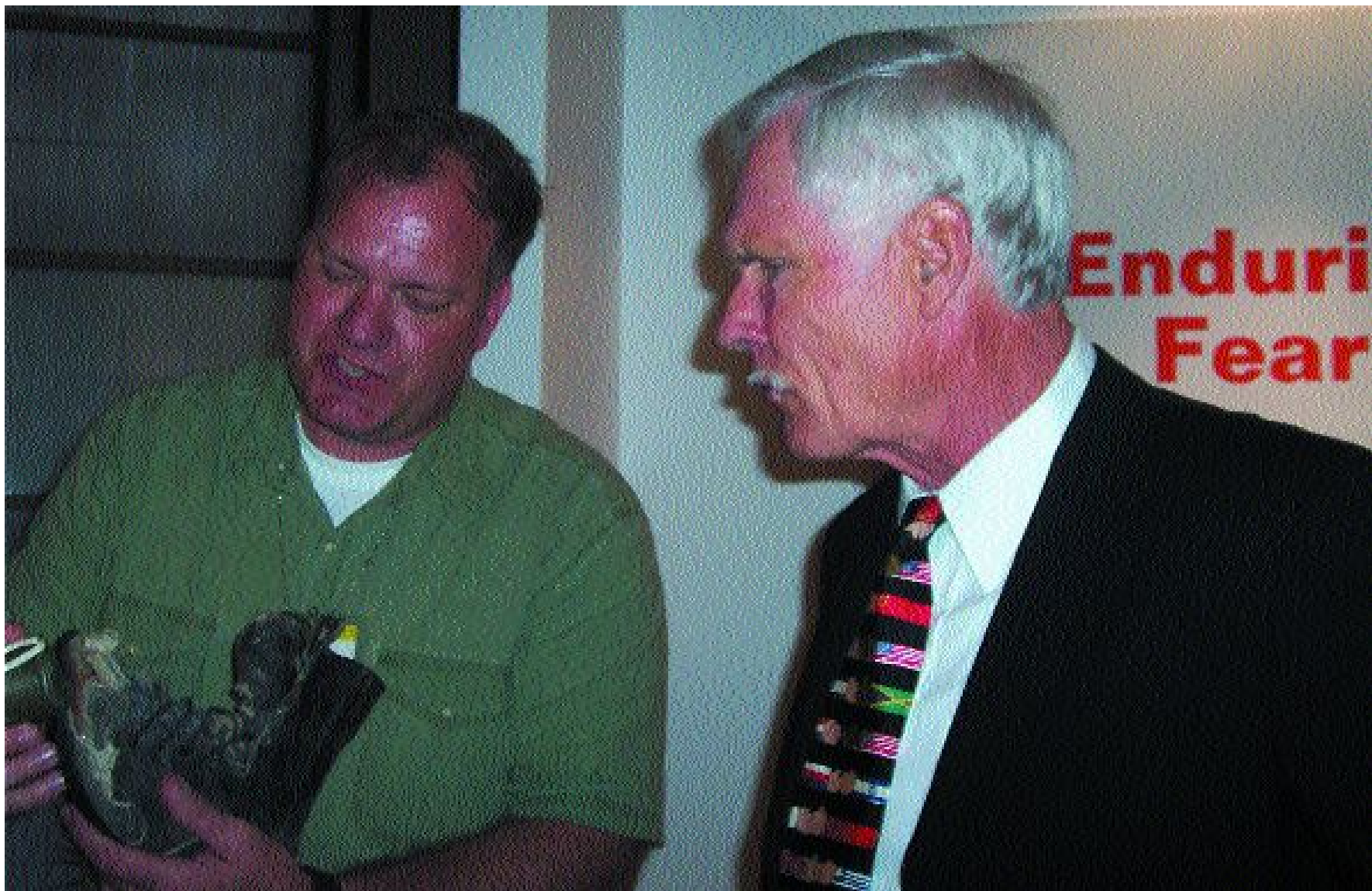


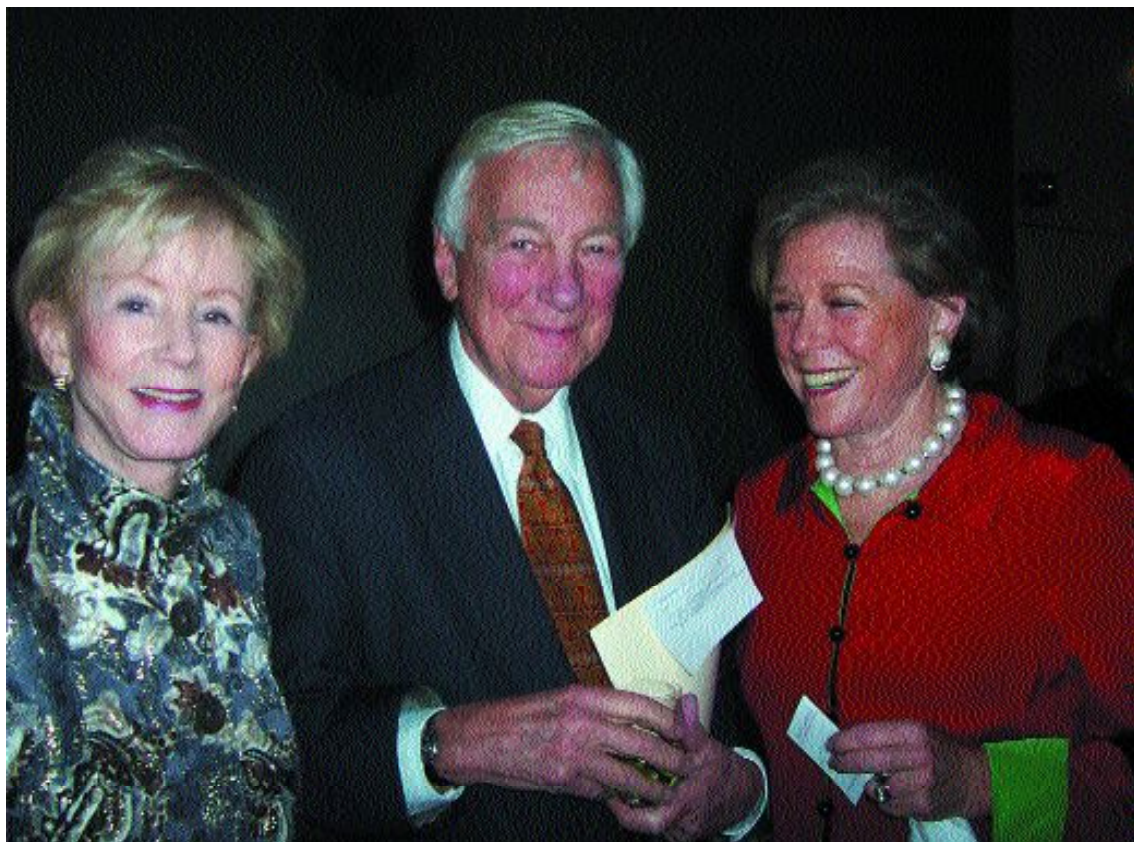

Every minefield cleared brings us [one step closer](#) to a safer world, a cleaner environment, more sustainable development, less hunger and poverty, and the elimination of one of the world's most pervasive and most solvable problems.

Adopt -A-Minefield has become the largest private funder of mine action in the world, clearing 25 million square meters of land and funding survivor assistance programs in the most mine-affected countries in the world.

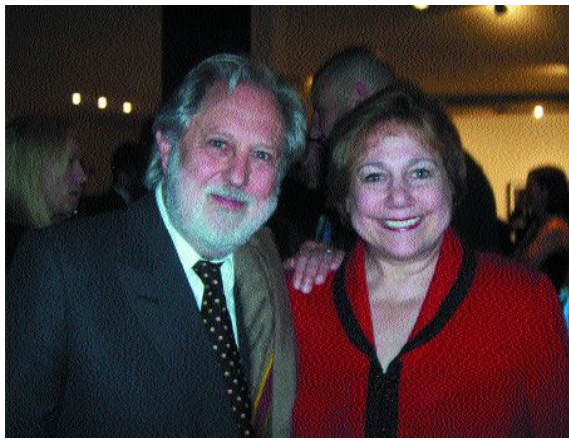
Funds raised from past benefits and invested in Adopt-A-Minefield's outreach programs have yielded a 400 percent return.

Adopt-A-Minefield is a campaign of the United Nations Association of the USA, in partnership with the United Nations and Ted Turner's Better World Fund, to raise awareness of the global landmine crisis and engage civil society in clearing minefields, providing assistance to landmine survivors, and returning the land to productive use.

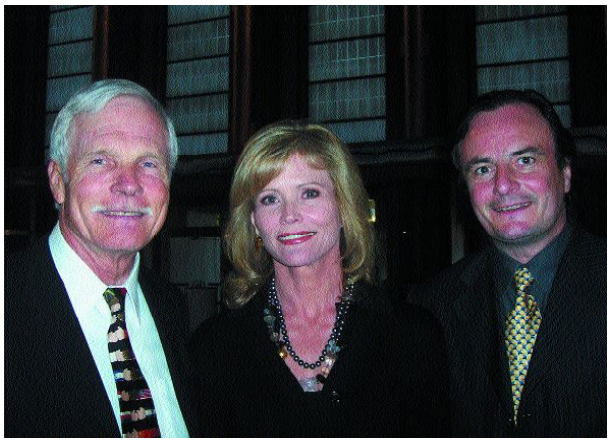

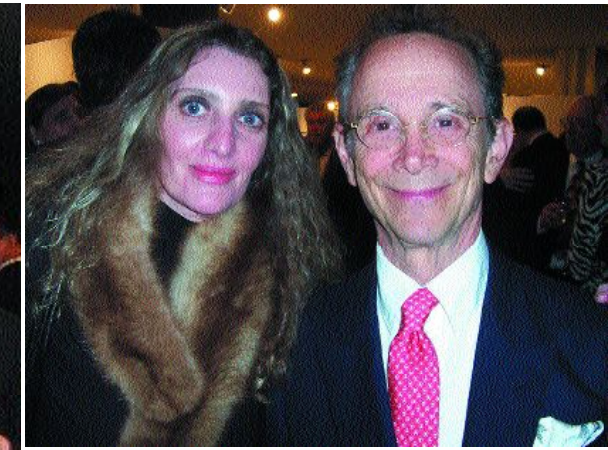
