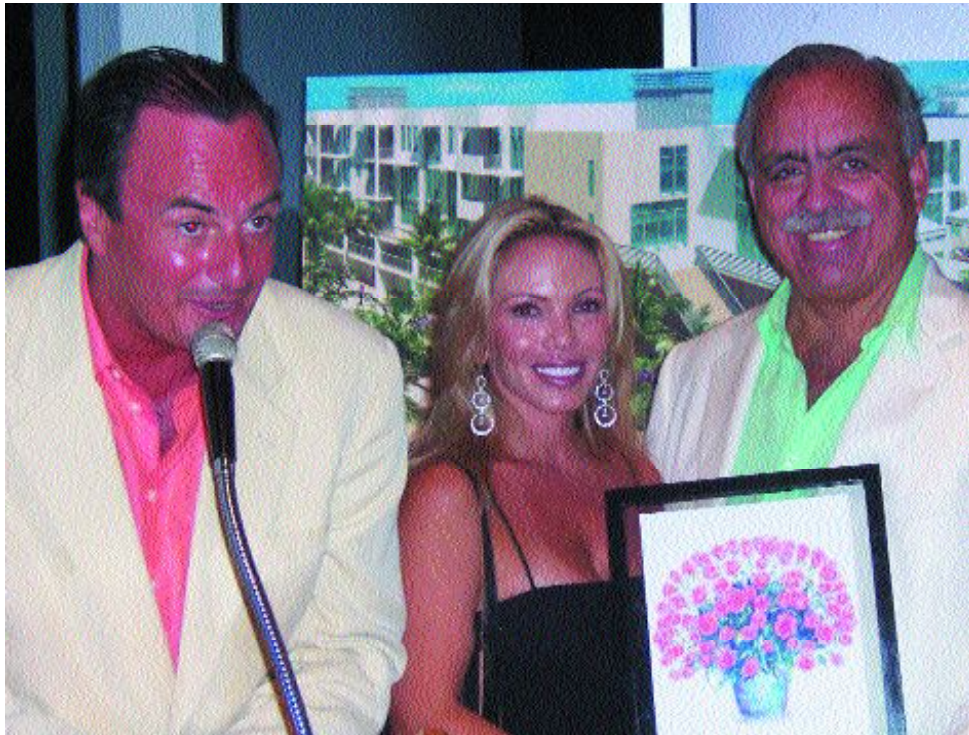

## The Palm Beach 2006 Entrepreneurial and Philanthropy Awards



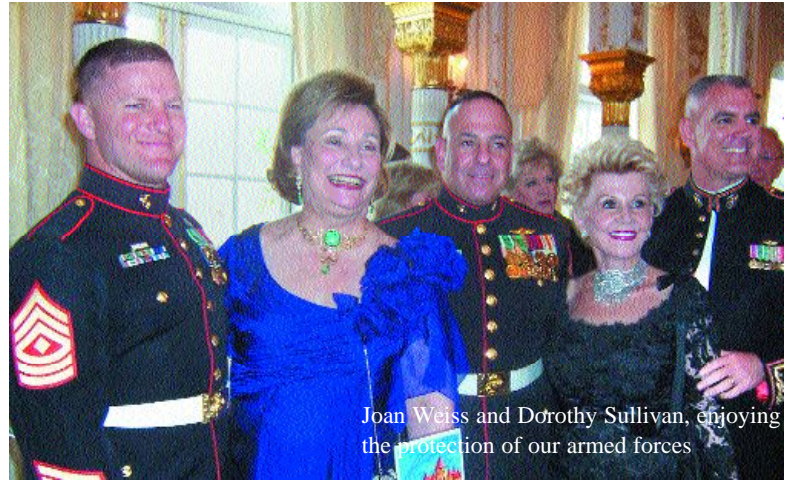

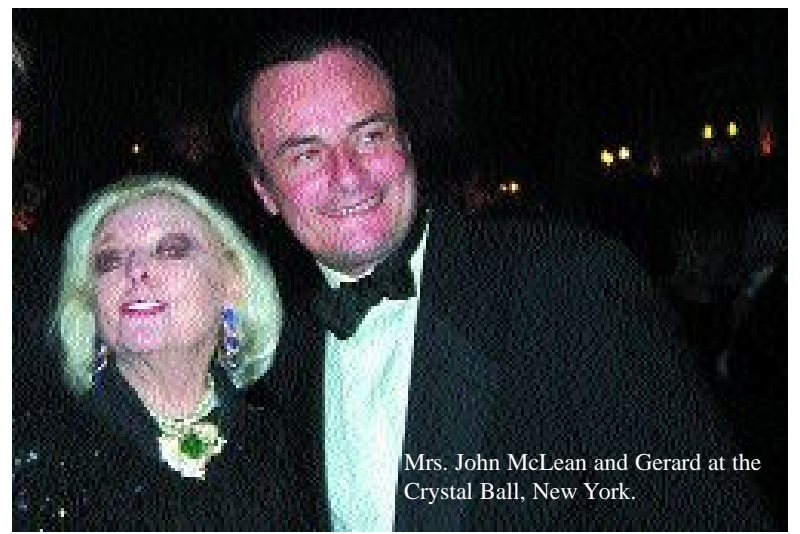

Lech Walesa, the charismatic Nobel Peace Prize Winner and former President of Poland, drew cheers, when he said:

"We encouraged (Mikhail Gorbachev) to try and reform Soviet Communism. We were certain that if he pulled one brick out, the structure would collapse. " The Communists were like radishes-red on the outside"
